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
## Barre to Templeton Rail Trail

This dirt rail trail runs from Route 122 in Barre, MA, to Route 2A in Templeton, MA. It is 12 miles long and has all sorts of side trails that bring hikers and bikers down along the Ware River, the Burnshirt River and Williamsville Pond. There is a dirt road that leads to a beautiful old cemetery called The Riverside Cemetery. This is a great place to mountain bike, hike or go fishing. There used to be a railroad that ran along this stretch. It was called the Ware River Secondary. You can find pieces of coal along the trail that were spit out by old trains.



A lot of the trail looks like this. It is very shady and flat and looks like a tunnel.


How to get there: follow Route 32 North until you see signs for Route 122 Worcester. When you get to 122 take a right and follow 122 South for about 1.5 miles. Here you will see a dirt road on the left. There is a parking area and boat launch here.




This could be a great fishing spot along the Ware River.



A fine view of the Ware river from one of the many side trails that lead from the Rail Trail to the river.




An old stone wall which was probably the border of some one's pasture years ago.



This cemetery seems to be in the middle of nowhere. It is at the junction of a dirt road and the rail trail. It sits along the river and is called the Riverside Cemetery.




A tributary joins the main body of the Ware River. This is another great fishing spot. Two guys were fishing here and said it was one of their favorite spots.

# Rockhouse Reservation Ware, MA.


The Rockhouse Reservation is a beautiful place to go if you don't want to be in the house. If you want to go for a walk or even a run this is a great spot. Some of the animals that we have seen here are foxes, beavers, porcupines, deer and turkey vultures. Some cool spots are the Rockhouse, Nature Center, Balance Rock and the Vista, the Rockhouse is a 20-30 foot high rock shelter, so don't climb up if your scared of heights. We also saw a Red-tailed hawk, woodpeckers and a Black throated green warbler.





### How to Get There:






Native Americans used to camp beneath these overhanging rocks.


These rocks which give the rockhouse it's name are a great place to play hide and seek or sardines.




Mike, Kyle, and Ben are climbing in the giant white oak tree.




This is a great shot looking up into the canopy.



A giant white oak tree hovers over all the other trees near the vista.




Here is the spectacular view from the Rockhouse vista.




This geocache had two parts.

the final cache is below.




## Swift River Belchertown, MA.

The Swift River is a great place to enjoy a Kayaking or canoeing trip. Its also a fun place to swim, but the water is always very cold since it is pumped from the bottom of the Quabbin Reservoir. 2 miles south there is a man made dam. and waterfall where you must turn around. To the north the river passes the lean-to camping area of the Herman Covey Wildlife Management Area. In 1 1/2 miles it becomes more tangled with trees. Along the river there are great spots to enjoy plentiful fishing stocked regularly at the fish hatchery. There are active beavers and other wildlife in this area as we caught many painted turtles and saw signs of river otters. All of these things make the Swift River a great place to go.




### How to get there:


Follow Route 9 west from Ware. You will pass the quabbin Park cemetery and then cross over the Swift River. Take a left onto East St. Follow east st. to the end and take a left onto Cold Spring Rd. The boat launch is a bout 200 feet up on the right.


This is a geocache we found along the Swift river.



This is a beautiful and magnificent waterfall at the end of our paddle in Bondsville.




This is a picture of the river from one of the banks.


This is a Mama goose sitting on her nest which has eggs in it.




This is James teaching us how a beaver tooth works on a tree.




This is a beaver tooth that fell off of a beaver.




